Blanks in the text are shown as they are found in the original minutes.

The spelling of names has been corrected wherever obvious misspellings have been found. Otherwise, the names are spelled as they appear in the minutes. Please note that sometimes several variations of the same name do occur.

Corrections and clarifications to people's names will be welcomed by the editorial staff. The goal is to make these minutes clear, accurate, and above all, useful to the reader.

Peace report is as follows:

It is with a feeling of deep regret and disappointment that we, your committee, are again compelled to call the attention of Friends to the awful suffering, the wanton destruction of property, much less the loss of so many thousands of lives of men, women and children in the warring countries about us. Oh how feeble our efforts seem to be in the face of such a calamity. And yet, if we can discern the signs of the times, do we not see the line of demarcation being so vividly drawn between the nations that are at peace and those at war with each other that he that runs {may?} certainly read, and by these demonstrations is not the Gospel of Peace being proclaimed to the World as never before.

And truly have we not as a peace loving people very much indeed to be devoutly thankful to our Heavenly Father for that amidst all the perplexing questions that have been thrust upon us as a nation that under the Devine blessing the President of this, our beloved country, and his immediate helpers, to whom we owe much, have been enabled to steer the ship of state that at present we are at peace with the world.

We are glad to note an increase of interest and activity on many lines of peace work. Considerable peace literature has been distributed during the year and quite a number are taking Messenger of Peace. The committee would recommend that it should be read by every family of Friends especially as much good though found on its pages. An interesting program was prepared and well rendered by both old and young on Feb. 14, it being the 100th anniversary of unbroken peace between this country and England.

All the morning was devoted to peace work, the Bible School joining in the exercises, and this was followed at ten-thirty by a rousing peace sermon by our Pastor Frank Cornell. Five other peace sermons have been given by our Pastor during the year. \$12.50 was donated by the school to aid the suffering, destitute aliens in England, the same being sent to Allen Hole of Richmond, Ind. to be forwarded to its proper destination. We note with much satisfaction the interest shown in talks on the peace question at the Quarterly Meeting culminating in the appointment of our beloved Pastor Frank Cornell as its delegate to attend the Peace Conference held at Chicago the 27 and 28 of 2nd month and he was enabled to attend its various sessions bringing back to us a full and interesting report of what he saw and heard. And now dear friends, we who are living under the great blessings of peace and prosperity in this, the 20th century, shall we not be found in the proper place in the church of our choice in defending those principles as advocated and promulgated by our Illustrious ancestors that the banner of peace may not, as it were, trail in the dust but that it may be borne aloft to the world that the oncoming generation may at least find the world made the better and not the worse by our having lived in it.

Your committee on Temperance is pleased to say that during the past year there has been a continuous spirit of advancement in the temperance cause, and that the meetings held under the supervision of the Friends Church upon the subject of temperance, together with the meeting of the Flying Squadron at the same church, have been well attended and all that could be desired by the most enthusiastic temperance advocates. The quarterly lessons of the Sunday School for years past, together with the persistent and continuous inculcation of temperance principles are bearing fruit that your committee believes will shortly bring statutory enactments, both in state and nation, gratifying to all who earnestly believe that prohibitory laws will be salutary for the moral and intellectual advancement of all our people.

The Funeral Committee reported having attended to the duties of the committee.

The Home Mission Committee submitted the following report:

Fifty magazines and a number of Sunday School Times were furnished the shut-ins who were deprived of attending church or Sunday School. A number of visits were made to discouraged members of our church.

Food and clothing to the amount of \$20.00 were given needy families.

The Social Committee reported attending faithfully to their duties, welcoming strangers cordially, and inviting them to return.

The Messenger Society report for the time from Sept. 1 to July 31 making 868 calls, giving 102 bouquets, \$44.11 paid for clothing and etc., \$5.00 sent to Southland College.

The Publishing Committee reported inserting church notices as they were received.

Pickett submitted the following Peace Report: In presenting this, our annual report, the committee feels too keenly that our efforts in promoting the cause of peace has indeed been feebly put forth as against the Holocaust of the terrible destruction of human life and property, much less the tens of thousands of helpless women and children in the war stricken country all brought on by the war lords of

that country and which is still raging with unabated fury. But amidst all this can we not see rising in the Far East a star of hope as we see members of our own beloved society pressing nobly to the front, caring for the sick and wounded, and rendering help in every way possible at a very great personal sacrifice that will eventually bring an abundant harvest.

And while this thought is before us we cannot silently pass by without making mention of the unrestful condition of affairs that have existed in our own beloved country and Mexico that was the cause of much grave concern for a time at least, but thanks for the earnest prayers and labors of the peace loving people all over our land as against the Jingoist, the Munitionest, the Militarist, and etc. The war cloud that seemed to be gathering over the horizon of our own country is gradually passing away as wiser judgment seems to prevail. In the past year we have 4 Peace sermons by our Pastor which have found their way into our county papers clippings of which were sent to Congressman Adair which elicited from him a gratifying reply. Our Monthly Meeting on two occasions sent memorials to our congressman and representatives setting forth our protest as against preparedness, so called, receiving in reply their recognition. A number of our members have written our Congressmen expressing in no uncertain sound Friends idea and belief in regard to any unnecessary preparedness that would eventually bring on war.

18 dollars was sent by our congregation to War sufferers in Belgium.

Peace literature has been distributed.

Members of Christian Endeavor have read the Message of Peace. The military Spirit has been subsiding and we should feel encouraged. If our Brothers fall wounded among thieves shall we not do as our good brothers across the sea, be found amongst them in the spirit of the good Samaritan, kindly administer the oil of consolation to their wounds.

Temperance report by B.F. Marsh: The Temperance lesson has been given each quarter in our Bible School. Repeated reference to the necessity of developing the Temperance spirit and inciting the membership to do all in its power to advance the Temperance cause has been at different times by our Pastor, both in the church services and social meetings, and speakers of national repute upon the subject of Temperance have given addresses in our midst that have aroused much enthusiasm for the cause so that not only the letter but the spirit of the T. {temperance} (cause) laws of the land are cordially obeyed by all who affiliate with us, and an increased sentiment for prohibition laws, nation wide is well nigh universal with our membership, and those who represent us, both in congress and in the state legislature, are encouraged to take every step within the scope of their duty to promote the cause of Temperance and suppress the evils of inebriety.


